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

Families in Upstate have excellent education opportunities available. Children get award-winning public schools, while adults get some of the best colleges in the south

PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Award-winning schools throughout the Upstate region

School-aged children in the Upstate area of South Carolina have access to many award-winning schools. The area includes ten counties, including Greenville, Anderson and Spartanburg, and has a population of approximately 1.4 million. In a recent survey, nearly 75% of the residents called the region an "excellent" or "very good" place to live, and access to excellent education is just one of the reasons.

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education in the UPSTATE SOUTH CAROLINA

The largest

Greenville County students have access to the largest school district in the state and the 45th-largest in the country. The county's school system is also the leader in the state when it comes to offering alternative schools, including magnet academies and charter schools with specialized arts and sciences curriculum. The AdvancED Accreditation Commission recognized Greenville as a high quality school district "with some of the finest schools the review team had ever seen."

Blue ribbon schools

Many Spartanburg County schools have earned statewide or nationwide recognition including Spartanburg High School of District 7, the first four-time National Blue Ribbon School that was also named one of the most rigorous high schools in the nation by the Washington Post.

Upstate-area students also have access to additional special focus centers that offer learning opportunities outside the standard public school offerings.

FOR EXAMPLE students in Greenville
County have access to special engineering
and arts schools such as The A.J. Whittenberg
Elementary School of Engineering in
Greenville. The South Carolina Governor's
School for the Arts and Humanities is a
high school for emerging artists offering
concentrations in creative writing, dance,
drama, music and visual arts.

<u>McCarthy Teszler School</u>, in Spartanburg, serves students aged five to 21 and offers specific programs for students who are disabled or handicapped or emotionally disabled.

High school students in Easley, as another example, may also be assigned to the state-of-the-art <u>Pickens County Career & Technology</u> <u>Center</u>. CTC provides skills and training in 20 different programs with a mission to ensure college and/or career readiness for the students.

Magnet Schools

Magnet schools offer children unique educational choices with "a theme or focus that is designed to give students an opportunity to explore a special interest, gift, talent or skill." Some of the magnet schools in Upstate require students to apply and be accepted into the schools. The application consists of information on the student's attendance record, discipline and grade average and a student statement indicating why the student would like to attend the magnet academy. However, other schools, with a goal to offer specialized education to a diverse group of students, enroll students via lottery.

There are almost 30 magnet schools combined in Greenville and Anderson County public schools. Make sure to check with your school district for information about magnet school offerings for your children.



Early and Middle Colleges

Developed by the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation as a way of giving high school students greater options and promoting higher education, this tuition-free program allows high-achieving, mature kids to study in small classes. Dual enrollment courses offer students the opportunity to earn college credits while completing their high school diploma.

Two of Upstate early colleges include:

<u>Greenville's Early College</u> is available for students in grades 6-8, soon to serve students through the 12th grade and focuses education on literacy, mathematics and critical thinking skills, with the opportunity to enroll in dual credit classes once in high school. Greenville Early College students will have the opportunity to apply to Clemson University, Furman University and/or USC Upstate, the program's partner schools. (See the Higher Education section below for more information on these colleges.)

The Viking Early College, in Spartanburg, a partnership between School District 7 and Spartanburg Community College, is a "rigorous yet supportive program" that compresses the time to complete high school and the first two years of college. The Viking program is a male-only program focused on "first-generation college goers" in families from Spartanburg.

CHARTER SCHOOLS

Another option for small classrooms and innovative learning

South Carolina charter schools are "independent public schools that are nonsectarian, nonreligious, non-home-based and nonprofit." As such, the schools are open to all students in any given county of residence, although they must apply and are subject to acceptance standards. Charter schools offer smaller classroom size and provide new, innovative and more flexible ways of education.

THERE ARE NUMEROUS CHARTER SCHOOLS THROUGHOUT THE UPSTATE **AREA SUCH AS:**

- Brashier Middle College Charter High **School** is at the Brashier campus of Greenville Technical College in Simpsonville. The curriculum includes a strong core academic program providing a personalized academic plan based upon each student's interests, talents and abilities, with an eye on sending them on their way to earning a college degree.
- Spartanburg Prep, in Spartanburg, offering single gender classes, class sizes limited to 12 students and a "Character Counts Curriculum," a character development framework, as well as foreign language, art, music and PE.
- The South Carolina Youth Leadership **Academy**, located on Clemson University's Youth Learning Institute in Pickens, is available to Easley middle school students,

grades 6-8. The school that is about eight miles outside of Easley, follows a curriculum focused on STEM courses.

PUBLIC SCHOOL ASSIGNMENT & CALENDAR

180-day school 'year'

ALL OF THE PUBLIC SCHOOL SYSTEMS

in Upstate S.C. follow the traditional school calendar schedule giving students an extended summer break. Nearly all of them start in late August and go through early June. Spartanburg County students often get out before Memorial Day for a slightly longer summer.

Choice

Students are most often assigned to their primary school based on their parents' home address. But the Greenville County School District, the largest school district in the state, offers "choice" schools to the residents. Through a choice program, parents may request that their children attend another school by requesting a change of assignment and entering the "lottery," or by applying to the school system's magnet academies. Some of the other school districts may offer limited choice, such as Laurens in Laurens County, for the Preparatory

Academy, where students in grades 6-12 receive positive behavior intervention.

PUBLIC SCHOOL TESTING

No way around the tests

Students all over Upstate S.C. follow the South Carolina State Department of Education testing requirements designed to measure their performance on the goals, objectives and competencies set forth by the state.

FOLLOWING IS A LIST OF THE STATE'S REQUIRED TESTS:

PASS (Palmetto Assessment of State Standards) Students take PASS in grades 3-8 and are tested on English language arts, mathematics, writing, social studies and science.

EOCEP (End-of-Course Examination Program)
The EOCEP tests high school core courses and middle school students for high school credit in the following subject areas: Algebra 1/Math for the Technologies 2; English 1; US History and the Constitution; and Biology 1/Applied Biology 2.

HSAP (High School Assessment Program) The HSAP is South Carolina's exit exam. Every student must pass the HSAP to graduate from high school.

SC-ALT (South Carolina Alternate Assessment) The SC-Alt is an alternate assessment for students with significant cognitive disabilities.



Students aged 8-13 and 15 as of September 1 of the assessment year are tested.

All of the schools post a calendar on their websites listing test days for each of the tests. Parents are encouraged to note the dates and ensure their children are present for all testing. Detailed information can be found with the State Board of Education at State-Assesments.gov.

PRIVATE SCHOOLS

56 alternative, tuition-based schools

There are 56 private schools in Greenville County, 21 in Spartanburg, 15 in Anderson County and many more throughout the Upstate area. Many of the private schools teach students in grades K-12 in one facility and nearly 90% of them are religiously affiliated giving parents choices for providing their children a faith-based education.

"Privates" offer small classroom size and low student-to-teacher ratios, with some of the Greenville County private schools boasting a 6:1 ratio, as compared to the public school state average of 16:1, giving students lots of individualized attention.

Private schools are tuition-based and often involve a competitive application process, however, many parents believe the benefits their children gain from the specialized curriculum and the competitive edge gained in college is worth the investment.

A SAMPLING OF PRIVATE SCHOOLS IN **UPSTATE INCLUDE** Montessori School of

Anderson, serving students from childhood through graduation, with a curriculum based on the Montessori methods and philosophy, a holistic curriculum designed to promote "the development of social skills, emotional growth and physical coordination as well as cognitive preparation; **Prince of Peace** <u>Catholic Church</u>, in Taylors, is a Pre-K4 to 8th grade school with a goal for students to be prepared for an honors high school curriculum and to be prepared for college; and *Meeting* <u>Street Academy</u>, in Spartanburg, for students aged K-5 with a focus on "rigorous, collegepreparatory education."

The numerous private schools in Greenville range from the The **Bob Jones Academy**, with an enrollment of over 1,000, offering education for students K-12 to the Camperdown <u>Academy</u> providing a "progressive education for bright dyslexic children" to <u>Augusta Road</u> Baptist Church Kindergarten with about 80 Pre-K and K students.

HOME SCHOOLING

Growing movement for homeschooling

Although just 10 years ago, homeschooling was considered "cutting edge" education, now some researchers report it is becoming more popular in South Carolina than private schooling. Currently, 2% of South Carolina students are being home schooled, or approximately 16,000 students.

THE TOP REASON PARENTS HOME SCHOOL

is for their concern about public schooling environments for their children. In addition, they cite a desire to provide religious or moral instruction, dissatisfaction with academics in other schools and a need for a non-traditional schedule and learning environment.

Required guidelines

Regardless of the reasons, parents must follow S.C. state guidelines in order to home school their children. Students in Upstate have three options available to them for home schooling their children: home school under the auspices of a school district; home school with support of the South Carolina Association of Independent Home Schools; or home school with support from a home school association of which the parent is a member. Parents are encouraged to select the option that is best for their children.

Some of the home school associations available include South Carolina Association of Independent Home Schools, Upstate Home <u>School Co-Op</u>, <u>Family TOUCH</u> and <u>Academic</u> Advantage Association.

Minimum time in home school

Home-schooled children throughout the Upstate region must receive instruction at least four and a half hours each day for 180 days of the year, but the daily schedule can be flexible. Students will follow a curriculum that includes reading, writing, arithmetic as well as other subjects mandated by the state. Students are also required to take the PASS, **HSAP** and **EOCEP** tests.

CHILD CARE

Follow your ABCs for quality care day care in Upstate

South Carolina wants to ensure parents have a safe, nurturing environment when they leave their children in day care; however, only licensed providers are required to meet the state's health and safety requirements. According to the state, "a quality provider has a set program along with written plans for the day; they also have standards for nutrition and physical activity." This means that when you drop your child off for day care, they are well cared for by a professional staff.

Grading Criteria

South Carolina offers a voluntary quality grading system for child care centers and encourages parents to look for the ABC Quality grades of centers before enrolling their children. Grading criteria include health and safety, teacher-to-child ratios, certifications of staff, on-going training for staff and much more.

There are more than 3,000 child care facilities in South Carolina representing the six different types of options available. The options include:



LICENSED CHILD CARE CENTERS are authorized for more than 12 children and are regularly inspected by the Child Care Licensing Staff.

REGISTERED FAITH-BASED CENTERS

care for 13 or more children, are sponsored by a religious organization with the option to be licensed.

LICENSED GROUP CHILD CARE HOMES

care for seven to 12 children in a provider's home and have regular visits from the Child Care Licensing Staff.

LICENSED FAMILY CHILD CARE HOMES

care for up to five children in a provider's home. The home is required to be licensed or registered if care is provided for more than one unrelated child.

REGISTERED FAMILY CHILD CARE HOMES

care for up to six children in the provider's home. The home is required to be licensed or registered if care is provided for more than one unrelated child. Child Care Licensing staff may make one unannounced visit each year and may also visit in response to a complaint.

FAMILIES, FRIENDS AND NEIGHBORS

There are no regulations, standards or requirements for daycare provided by families, friends or neighbors.

HIGHER EDUCATION

Up-and-coming colleges in "Tiger" Country

Not only are they in "Tiger" country with Clemson University, one of the premier universities of the South, but they are also near the #1 Up-and-Coming Regional College in the South, Anderson University, and Furman University, internationally recognized for its beautiful campus.

The list of Upstate colleges seems to go on and on, but here is a start:

ANDERSON UNIVERSITY in Anderson S.C. has received its share of accolades - One of America's 100 Best College Buys, One of the Best Regional Colleges in the South (#21), the #1 Up-and-Coming Regional College in the South and the #1 Regional College in the South with the Best Undergraduate Teaching. PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Magnet schools challenge students

Anderson students are served by <u>District</u> 5 of Anderson County School District.

District 5 serves students through its nine elementary schools, three middle schools, and three high schools.

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- HIGHER EDUCATION

AVID- Advancement Via Individual Determination

Anderson District 5 students also have access to four AVID (Advancement Via Individual Determination) school programs. AVID students are B, C, and sometime D students who have the desire to go to college and the willingness to work hard, but need additional support. Many of these students will be the first in their families to attend college or are from socio-economically disadvantaged families.

AVID schools are: T. L. Hanna High School, an International Baccalaureate World School; Westside High School, an Early College Academy; Glenview Middle School of Choice; and Robert Anderson College and Career Academy, an AVID demonstration site.

Magnet Schools

Magnet schools in Anderson provide children unique educational choices with "a theme or focus that is designed to give students an opportunity to explore a special interest, gift, talent or skill." The curriculum is taught using strategies centered on the magnet school's theme. Students must apply and be accepted into the schools, and all students residing in the geographic area served by Anderson School District Five may apply for admission to three magnet schools.

Anderson residents have a wide variety of magnet schools from which to choose. There are 11 elementary magnet schools, five middle school magnet schools and two high school magnet schools.

A Top 5 school

Magnet schools in Anderson include: Calhoun Academy of the Arts, for K-5, integrates drama, music, dance, visual arts, and creative writing into teaching all subjects; Centerville Academy of 21st Century Learning focuses on 21st-century skills-collaboration, creativity, communication and critical thinking; Midway Elementary School of Science and Engineering, a magnet school dedicated to STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math) education; Glenview Middle School offering middle school students an education in academics, arts, and athletics; and TL Hanna High School, an International Baccalaureate World School, named the #5 top ranked SC school by U.S. News & World Report.

Early and Middle Colleges

Developed by the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation as a way of giving high school students greater options and promoting higher education, this tuition-free program allows high-achieving, mature kids to study in small classes. Dual enrollment courses offer students the opportunity to earn college credits while completing their high school diploma.



Early College Academy

Westside High School is an Early College Academy for 9-12 grade students. At present, English, math, social studies, and science classes are taught in the academy. Students that are accepted into Westside typically exhibit "maturity, determination, and responsibility in their demeanor and communication skills."

CHARTER SCHOOLS

Learn your way

Anderson charter schools, as mandated by the State Department of Education, are independent public schools that are nonsectarian, nonreligious, non-home-based, and nonprofit. As such, the schools are open to all students in Anderson, although they must apply and are subject to acceptance standards. Charter school instructors are allowed the freedom to be more innovative, but they are also held accountable to the same academic standards as all state public schools.

The Anderson 5 Charter School offers a nontraditional educational setting, "any time, any place, any path, any pace," to educate students "who model integrity, citizenship, and the value of lifelong learning."

PUBLIC SCHOOL ASSIGNMENT & CALENDAR

Stay near your home, or choose a magnet

The 15 public schools in Anderson follow the traditional school calendar schedule - late August through early June - and meet 180 days.

Anderson students are assigned to a homebased school based on the address where their parents reside, however, parents may request that their children attend another school by requesting a change of assignment by applying to the school system's magnet academies. Some magnet schools have acceptance standards. See Anderson 5 Magnet School FAQ's for more information on school choice.

PUBLIC SCHOOL TESTING

Testing progress against the state's standards

Students in Anderson public schools follow the South Carolina State Department of Education testing requirements designed to measure student performance on the goals, objectives and competencies set forth by the State. Following is a list of the state's required tests:

PASS (PALMETTO ASSESSMENT OF STATE

STANDARDS) Students take PASS in grades 3-8 and are tested on English language arts, mathematics, writing, social studies, and science.

EOCEP (END-OF-COURSE EXAMINATION

PROGRAM) The EOCEP tests high school core courses and middle school students for high school credit in the following subject areas: Algebra 1/Math for the Technologies 2; English 1; US History and the Constitution; and Biology 1/Applied Biology 2.

HSAP (HIGH SCHOOL ASSESSMENT

PROGRAM) The HSAP is South Carolina's exit exam. Every student must pass the HSAP to graduate from High School.

SC-ALT (SOUTH CAROLINA ALTERNATE ASSESSMENT) The SC-Alt is an alternate assessment for students with significant cognitive disabilities. Students aged eight to 13 and 15 as of September 1 of the assessment year are tested.

PRIVATE SCHOOLS

Faith-based learning

"Privates" offer small classroom size and low teacher-to-student ratios, affording students individualized attention. Many of the private schools across South Carolina house students in grades K-12 and are religiously affiliated.

Private schools are tuition-based and often involve a competitive application process, however, many parents believe the cost is

worth it for the specialized curriculum and the competitive edge many students gain in college.

There are 15 private schools in Anderson County with an enrollment of approximately 1,500 students.

Montessori School of Anderson curriculum is based on the Montessori methods and philosophy, a holistic curriculum designed to promote "the development of social skills, emotional growth, and physical coordination as well as cognitive preparation." Students are assigned to "classes" that correspond to the developmental stages of childhood, while the curriculum follows the child's needs and skills. Montessori serves students from childhood through graduation. In a partnership with Anderson University, Montessori juniors and seniors may take up to 30 semester hours of college courses in the School of Arts and Sciences that count for dual credit.

<u>St Joseph Catholic School</u> teaches students K-8 while instilling Catholic faith and values. St. Joseph follows the curriculum standards of the Catholic Diocese of Charleston. The school offers the standard math, English, science and social studies curriculum as well as specialized offerings including Spanish, Latin, music and art.

Other private schools in Anderson include Calvary's Kids Preschool and First Presbyterian Day School for PK and K students, Temple Christian Academy for PK-9, and Trinity Christian Education School serving K-12.



HOME SCHOOLING

Flexible schedule under the watchful eye of parents

Although just 10 years ago, homeschooling was considered "cutting edge" education it is now becoming more and more popular in the U.S. and in South Carolina. Whether parents are concerned about the public school environment, their children have special needs, or they want to instill family and religious values on their children without the cost of private schools, more and more parents are choosing to home school their children. In South Carolina approximately 2%, or 16,000, children are home schooled.

Three options available

Parents in Anderson have three options available to them for home schooling their children: home school under the auspices of a school district; home school with support of the South Carolina Association of Independent Home Schools; or home school with support from a home school association of which the parent is a member. Some of the local home school associations available to Anderson parents include <u>South</u> <u>Carolina Association of Independent Home</u> Schools, Anderson Home School Association and Carolina HomeSchooler.

Rules to follow

Home schooled children in Anderson must receive instruction at least four and a halfhours each day for 180 days of the year, although the parents have flexibility in the daily schedule. Students must follow

a curriculum that includes reading, writing, arithmetic as well as other subjects mandated by the state. Students are also required to take the PASS, HSAP, and EOCEP tests.

CHILD CARE

Keep your child safe and learning

South Carolina wants to ensure parents have a safe, nurturing environment when they leave their children in day care; however, only licensed providers are required to meet the state's health and safety requirements. The state also notes that "a quality provider has a set program along with written plans for the day; they also have standards for nutrition and physical activity." This means that when you drop your child off for day care they are well cared for by a professional staff.

Check your ABCs

South Carolina offers a voluntary quality grading system for child care centers, and encourages parents to look for the ABC Quality grades of centers before enrolling their children. Grading criteria include health and safety, teacher-to-child ratios, certifications of staff, on-going training for staff and much more. Make sure to check your ABCs when you are looking for day care.

education in ANDERSON

There are more than 3,000 child care facilities in South Carolina representing the six different types of options available. The options include:

LICENSED CHILD CARE CENTERS are authorized for more than 12 children and are regularly inspected by the Child Care Licensing Staff.

REGISTERED FAITH-BASED CENTERS care for 13 or more children, are sponsored by a religious organization with the option to be licensed.

LICENSED GROUP CHILD CARE HOMES care for seven to 12 children in a provider's home and have regular visits from the Child Care Licensing Staff.

LICENSED FAMILY CHILD CARE HOMES care for up to five children in a provider's home. The home is required to be licensed or registered if care is provided for more than one unrelated child.

REGISTERED FAMILY CHILD CARE HOMES care for up to six children in the provider's home. The home is required to be licensed or registered if care is provided for more than one unrelated child. Child Care Licensing staff may make one unannounced visit each year and may also visit in response to a complaint.

FAMILIES, FRIENDS AND NEIGHBORS

There are no regulations, standards or requirements for daycare provided by families, friends or neighbors.

FOUNTAIN INN STUDENTS IN GRADES

Humanities. The public, residential high school is for emerging artists offering concentrations in creative writing, dance, drama, music and visual arts. Students must apply and audition to be accepted for the program. There is no charge for tuition, but there is a room and board fee.

THE FINE ARTS CENTER OF GREENVILLE

COUNTY in the Wade Hampton High School in Greenville is open to about 400 students who wish to pursue architecture, theatre, dance, visual arts, music, creative writing, or digital filmmaking. Students must apply to the Center. The students attend five days a week in either the morning or afternoon for 110 minutes of instruction beyond their standard high school program.

Magnet Schools

Magnet schools in Fountain Inn provide children unique educational choices with "a theme or focus that is designed to give students an opportunity to explore a special interest, gift, talent or skill." Students must apply and be accepted into the schools. There are 11 total magnet schools available to Greenville School District students, three elementary magnet academies, four middle school magnet schools and four high school magnet academies.

CHARTER SCHOOLS

Independent learning environments

Greenville County charter schools are "independent public schools that are nonsectarian, nonreligious, non home-based and nonprofit." As such, the schools are open to all students in Greenville County and Fountain Inn, although they must apply and are subject to acceptance standards. Charter schools offer smaller classroom size and provide new, innovative and more flexible ways of education.

THERE IS ONE CHARTER SCHOOL just six miles away in Simpsonville and four charter schools about 20 miles away in Greenville: Brashier Middle College Charter High School (BMCHS) (in Simpsonville); Greenville Technical Charter High School, 9-12 grades; Langston Charter Middle School, 6-8 grades; Legacy Charter School, K-12 grades; and Meyer Center for Special Children for preschool children with special needs and disabilities.

Home for the holidays, and every day

The top reason parents home school is for their concern about public schooling environments for their children. Currently, 2% of South Carolina students are being homeschooled, or approximately 16,000 students.



PARENTS IN FOUNTAIN INN HAVE THREE

OPTIONS available to them for home schooling their children: home school under the auspices of a school district; home school with support of the South Carolina Association of Independent Home Schools; or home school with support from a home school association of which the parent is a member. PASS (PALMETTO ASSESSMENT OF STATE **STANDARDS**) Students take PASS in grades

EOCEP (END-OF-COURSE EXAMINATION

PROGRAM) 'The EOCEP tests high school core courses and middle school students for

high school credit in the following subject areas: Algebra 1/Math for the Technologies 2; English 1; US History and the Constitution; and Biology 1/Applied Biology 2.

HSAP (HIGH SCHOOL ASSESSMENT

PROGRAM) The HSAP is South Carolina's exit exam. Every student must pass the HSAP to graduate from high school.

SC-ALT (SOUTH CAROLINA ALTERNATE

ASSESSMENT) The SC-Alt is an alternate assessment for students with significant cognitive disabilities. Students aged 8-13 and 15 as of September 1 of the assessment year are tested.

REGISTERED FAITH-BASED CENTERS care for 13 or more children, are sponsored by a religious organization with the option to be licensed.

LICENSED GROUP CHILD CARE HOMES care for seven to 12 children in a provider's home and have regular visits from the Child Care Licensing Staff.

LICENSED FAMILY CHILD CARE HOMES

care for up to five children in a provider's home. The home is required to be licensed or registered if care is provided for more than one unrelated child.

REGISTERED FAMILY CHILD CARE HOMES

care for up to six children in the provider's home. The home is required to be licensed or registered if care is provided for more than one unrelated child. Child Care Licensing staff may make one unannounced visit each year and may also visit in response to a complaint.

FAMILIES, FRIENDS AND NEIGHBORS

There are no regulations, standards or requirements for daycare provided by families, friends or neighbors.



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HSAP (HIGH SCHOOL ASSESSMENT PROGRAM) The HSAP is South Carolina's exit exam. Every student must pass the HSAP to graduate from high school.

SC-ALT (SOUTH CAROLINA ALTERNATE ASSESSMENT) The SC-Alt is an alternate assessment for students with significant cognitive disabilities. Students aged 8-13 and 15 as of September 1 of the assessment year are tested.

PRIVATE SCHOOLS

Specialized curriculum for a competitive edge

Private schools are tuition-based and often involve a competitive application process, however, many parents believe the cost is worth it for the specialized curriculum and the competitive edge many students gain in college.

56 available

There are 56 private schools in Greenville County of which 36 are located in Greenville. "Privates" offer small classroom size and low teacher-to-student ratios, with Greenville County private schools boasting a 10:1 ratio. Many of the private schools house students in grades K-12 and are religiously affiliated.

Private schools in Greenville range from the The <u>Bob Jones Academy</u>, with an enrollment of over 1,000, offering education for students K-12 to the <u>Camperdown Academy</u> providing a "progressive education for bright dyslexic children" to <u>Augusta Road Baptist Church</u> Kindergarten with about 80 Pre-K and K students.

HOME SCHOOLING

Manage your children's learning environment

Although just 10 years ago, homeschooling was considered "cutting edge" education it is now becoming more and more popular in the U.S. and in South Carolina. The top reason parents home school is for their concern about public schooling environments for their children. Currently, 2% of South Carolina students are being homeschooled, or approximately 16,000 students.

Help for your homeschooling

Parents in Greenville have three options available to them for home schooling their children: home school under the auspices of a school district; home school with support of the South Carolina Association of Independent Home Schools; or home school with support from a home school association of which the parent is a member. Some of the home school associations available to Greenville parents include South Carolina Association of Independent Home Schools, Upstate Home School Co-Op, Family TOUCH and Insights On Education.



Four and one-half hours per day

Home schooled children in Greenville must receive instruction at least four and a half hours each day for 180 days of the year. Students will follow a curriculum that includes reading, writing, arithmetic as well as other subjects mandated by the state. Students are also required to take the PASS, HSAP and **EOCEP** tests.

CHILD CARE

Remember your ABCs when you are looking for day care!

South Carolina wants to ensure parents have a safe, nurturing environment when they leave their children in day care; however, only licensed providers are required to meet the state's health and safety requirements. According to the state, "a quality provider has a set program along with written plans for the day; they also have standards for nutrition and physical activity." This means that when you drop your child off for day care, they are well cared for by a professional staff.

Grading Criteria

South Carolina offers a voluntary quality grading system for child care centers and encourages parents to look for the ABC Quality grades of centers before enrolling their children. Grading

criteria include health and safety, teacher-tochild ratios, certifications of staff, on-going training for staff and much more.

There are more than 3,000 child care facilities in South Carolina representing the six different types of options available. The options include:

LICENSED CHILD CARE CENTERS are authorized for more than 12 children and are regularly inspected by the Child Care Licensing Staff.

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LICENSED GROUP CHILD CARE HOMES

care for seven to 12 children in a provider's home and have regular visits from the Child Care Licensing Staff.

LICENSED FAMILY CHILD CARE HOMES

care for up to five children in a provider's home. The home is required to be licensed or registered if care is provided for more than one unrelated child.

REGISTERED FAMILY CHILD CARE HOMES



Mauldin students attend schools within the Greenville County School District, the largest school district in South Carolina and the 45thlargest school system in the United States. There are five public schools for the students to attend, as well as numerous charter and private schools. Nearly 72,000 students attend schools in the district.

Three-one-one

Mauldin High School students also have access to the Greenville County Virtual School Program that offers online courses for credit towards a high school diploma, that are transferred to the students' home school upon completion of the class. These classes are in addition to full-time school. A fee may be charged.

'Tis twilight time

In addition, Mauldin High students have access to content recovery or a twilight school that meets after school hours Monday through Thursday. Students may earn core English and math credits towards a high school diploma. Students will be tested for course credit.

Special focus centers:

The A.J. Whittenberg Elementary School of Engineering in Greenville, about eight miles from Mauldin, is the most technologically advanced elementary school in Greenville County. With a learning emphasis on fostering curiosity through engineering, teamwork and technology, the approximately 500 students in grades K through 5 have a STEM-based curriculum. Whittenberg is a public school —

it's not a magnet, charter, or special school - and a school of choice within Greenville County. Students are admitted each year on a first-come, first-served basis.

SC Governor's School

Greenville is also home to the South Carolina Governor's School for the Arts and Humanities. The public, residential high school is for emerging artists offering concentrations in creative writing, dance, drama, music and visual arts. Students must apply and audition to be accepted for the program. There is no charge for tuition, but there is a room and board fee. Programs are available for students in grades 10-12.

THE FINE ARTS CENTER of Greenville County in Greenville is open to about 400 students who wish to pursue architecture, theatre, dance, visual arts, music, creative writing, or digital filmmaking. Students must apply to the center. The students attend five days a week in either the morning or afternoon for 110 minutes of instruction beyond their standard high school program.

MAGNET SCHOOLS in Greenville County provide Mauldin children unique educational choices with "a theme or focus that is designed to give students an opportunity to explore a special interest, gift, talent or skill." Students must apply and be accepted into the schools. There are three elementary magnet academies, four middle school magnet schools and four high school magnet academies available to students. EARLY AND MIDDLE COLLEGES Developed by the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation as a way of giving high school students greater options and promoting higher education, this tuition-free program allows high-achieving, mature kids to study in small classes. Dual enrollment courses offer students the opportunity to earn college credits while completing their high school diploma.

<u>Greenville's Early College</u>, just eight miles from Mauldin, is available for students in grades 6-8 and focuses education on literacy, mathematics and critical thinking skills, with the opportunity to enroll in dual credit classes once in high school. Greenville Early College students will have the opportunity to apply to Clemson University, Furman University and/or USC Upstate, the program's partner schools.

Greer Middle College, about 16 miles away in Greer, is a small school with about 400 students serving grades 9-12, with nearly 150 of the students earning college credits. Any student in the Greenville County school district is eligible to attend through open enrollment, meaning no admission tests or tuition.

CHARTER SCHOOLS

Open to all students with no fee attached

Greenville County charter schools are "independent public schools that are nonsectarian, nonreligious, non-home-based and nonprofit." As such, the schools are open to all students in Mauldin, although they

must apply and are subject to acceptance standards. Charter schools offer smaller classroom size and provide new, innovative and more flexible ways of education.

THERE IS ONE CHARTER SCHOOL five miles away in Simpsonville, and four charter schools about eight miles away in Greenville. Brashier Middle College Charter High School (BMCHS) is held at the Brashier campus of Greenville Technical College in Simpsonville. The curriculum includes a strong core academic program providing a personalized academic plan based upon each student's interests, talents and abilities, with an eye on sending them on their way to earning a college degree.

Greenville Technical Charter High School, 9-12 grades; Langston Charter Middle School, 6-8 grades; Legacy Charter School, K-12 grades; and Meyer Center for Special Children for preschool children with special needs and disabilities, are all in Greenville.

PASS (PALMETTO ASSESSMENT OF STATE **STANDARDS**) Students take PASS in grades 3-8 and are tested on English language arts, mathematics, writing, social studies and science.

EOCEP (END-OF-COURSE EXAMINATION PROGRAM) The EOCEP tests high school core courses and middle school students for high school credit in the following subject areas: Algebra 1/Math for the Technologies 2; English 1; US History and the Constitution; and Biology 1/Applied Biology 2.

HSAP (HIGH SCHOOL ASSESSMENT PROGRAM) The HSAP is South Carolina's exit exam. Every student must pass the HSAP to graduate from high school.

SC-ALT (SOUTH CAROLINA ALTERNATE ASSESSMENT) The SC-Alt is an alternate assessment for students with significant cognitive disabilities. Students aged 8-13 and 15 as of September 1 of the assessment year are tested.

one unrelated child. Child Care Licensing staff may make one unannounced visit each year and may also visit in response to a complaint.

HSAP (HIGH SCHOOL ASSESSMENT

Currently, 2% of South Carolina students are being homeschooled, or approximately 16,000 students.

PARENTS IN SIMPSONVILLE HAVE THREE

OPTIONS available to them for home schooling their children: home school under the auspices of a school district; home school with support of the South Carolina Association of Independent Home Schools; or home school with support from a home school association of which the parent is a member. Some of the home school associations available to Simpsonville parents include South Carolina Association of Independent Home Schools, Upstate Home School Co-Op, Family TOUCH, Christian Homeschoolers' Association of S.C. and Insights On Education.

Home-schooled children in Simpsonville must receive instruction at least four and a half hours each day for 180 days of the year, although parents have flexibility with the schedule. Students will follow a curriculum that includes reading, writing, arithmetic as well as other subjects mandated by the state. Students are also required to take the PASS, **HSAP** and **EOCEP** tests.

CHILD CARE

Consider ABC ratings

South Carolina wants to ensure children have a safe, nurturing environment when they attend day care, however, only licensed providers are required to meet the State's health and safety requirements.

The State suggests parents seek out qualified care centers and notes that "a quality provider has a set program along with written plans for the day; they also have standards for nutrition and physical activity." This means that when you drop your child off for day care, they are well cared for by a professional staff.

Grading Criteria

South Carolina offers a voluntary quality grading system for child care centers and encourages parents to look for the ABC Quality grades of centers before enrolling their children. Grading criteria include health and safety, teacher-to-child ratios, certifications of staff, on-going training for staff and much more.

There are more than 3,000 child care facilities in South Carolina representing the six different types of options available. The options include:

LICENSED CHILD CARE CENTERS are authorized for more than 12 children and metroguide

are regularly inspected by the Child Care Licensing Staff.

REGISTERED FAITH-BASED CENTERS care for 13 or more children, are sponsored by a religious organization with the option to be licensed.

care for seven to 12 children in a provider's home and have regular visits from the Child Care Licensing Staff.

care for up to five children in a provider's home. The home is required to be licensed or registered if care is provided for more than one unrelated child.

REGISTERED FAMILY CHILD CARE HOMES-care for up to six children in the provider's home. The home is required to be licensed or registered if care is provided for more than one unrelated child. Child Care Licensing staff may make one unannounced visit each year and may also visit in response to a complaint.

FAMILIES, FRIENDS AND NEIGHBORS

THE FINE ARTS CENTER OF GREENVILLE

COUNTY in the Wade Hampton High School in Greenville is open to about 400 students who wish to pursue architecture, theatre, dance, visual arts, music, creative writing, or digital filmmaking. Students must apply to the center. The students attend five days a week in either the morning or afternoon for 110 minutes of instruction beyond their standard high school program.

Magnet Schools

Grading criteria include health and safety, teacher-to-child ratios, certifications of staff, on-going training for staff and much more

There are more than 3,000 child care facilities in South Carolina representing the six different types of options available. The options include:

LICENSED CHILD CARE CENTERS are authorized for more than 12 children and are regularly inspected by the Child Care Licensing Staff.

REGISTERED FAITH-BASED CENTERS care for 13 or more children, are sponsored by a

religious organization with the option to be licensed.

LICENSED GROUP CHILD CARE HOMES

care for seven to 12 children in a provider's home and have regular visits from the Child Care Licensing Staff.

Individual Determination) supports students who are B-, C- and sometimes D-students who have the desire to go to college and the willingness to work hard, but need additional support. Greenwood AVID schools include Emerald High School, Greenwood High School and Northside Middle School. Students accepted into the program will also have an inschool academic support beginning in grade 6.

<u>Greenwood School of Inquiry</u>, at Hodges Elementary School, is available to all rising K5-fifth grade students. Students who are already zoned to attend Hodges Elementary School will participate in the GSI model and all other Greenwood students can apply via a lottery application system. The school of choice uses the standard curriculum with a focus on incorporating research, data and technology as primary learning tools.

Genesis Education Center houses a variety of programs under one roof: Jumpstart, Afternoon Credit Recovery and Refocus Academy. Jumpstart offers "over-aged" 8th graders an opportunity to complete course work to start the next year as a 10th grader. Afternoon Credit Recovery gives Greenwood HS and Emerald HS students use of labs to make up missed credit. The Refocus Academy offers students course work as opposed to expulsion.

The Frank Russell Career Center offers students grades 9-12 a specialized program to develop the technical skills to be prepared for a career.

Magnet Schools

Magnet schools in Greenwood provide children unique educational choices with "a theme or focus that is designed to give students an opportunity to explore a special interest, gift, talent or skill." Students must apply and be accepted into the schools. There are three magnet schools available to Greenwood students.

Arts, Communication and Theatre School (ACTS), providing artistically talented students with an academically challenging arts-integrated curriculum, is available for fifth through eighth grade students.

The Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics School (STEMS) is located at Westview Middle School and is available to rising sixth grade students. PUBLIC SCHOOL TESTING

Department of Education tests student and school progress

Students in Greenwood public schools must follow the South Carolina State Department of Education testing requirements designed to measure performance on the goals, objectives and competencies set forth by the state. Following is a list of the State's required tests:

PASS (PALMETTO ASSESSMENT OF STATE **STANDARDS)** Students take PASS in grades 3-8 and are tested on English language arts, mathematics, writing, social studies and science.

PASS (PALMETTO ASSESSMENT OF STATE

STANDARDS) Students take PASS in grades 3-8 and are tested on English language arts, mathematics, writing, social studies and science.

EOCEP (END-OF-COURSE EXAMINATION

PROGRAM) The EOCEP tests high school core courses and middle school students for high school credit in the following subject areas: Algebra 1/Math for the Technologies 2; English 1; US History and the Constitution; and Biology 1/Applied Biology 2.

HSAP (HIGH SCHOOL ASSESSMENT

PROGRAM) The HSAP is South Carolina's exit exam. Every student must pass the HSAP to graduate from high school.

SC-ALT (SOUTH CAROLINA ALTERNATE

ASSESSMENT) The SC-Alt is an alternate assessment for students with significant cognitive disabilities. Students aged 8-13 and 15 as of September 1 of the assessment year are tested.

Private schools for any age

For cutting edge education, stay at home

Although just 10 years ago, homeschooling was considered "cutting edge" education it is now becoming more and more popular in the U.S. and in South Carolina. Currently, 2% of South Carolina students are being homeschooled, or approximately 16,000 students.

3 choices

Required time

Home-schooled children in Laurens must receive instruction at least four and a half hours each day for 180 days of the year, although the daily schedule can vary. Students will follow a curriculum that includes reading, writing, arithmetic as well as other subjects mandated by the state. Students are also required to take the PASS, HSAP and EOCEP tests.

CHILD CARE

Check the grade before selecting daycare for your children

Grading Criteria

Grading criteria include health and safety, teacher-to-child ratios, certifications of staff, on-going training for staff and much more.

There are more than 3,000 child care facilities in South Carolina representing the six different types of options available. The options include:

LICENSED CHILD CARE CENTERS are authorized for more than 12 children and are regularly inspected by the Child Care Licensing Staff.

REGISTERED FAITH-BASED CENTERS

care for 13 or more children, are sponsored by a religious organization with the option to be licensed.

LICENSED GROUP CHILD CARE HOMES

care for seven to 12 children in a provider's home and have regular visits from the Child Care Licensing Staff.

LICENSED FAMILY CHILD CARE HOMES

care for up to five children in a provider's home. The home is required to be licensed or registered if care is provided for more than one unrelated child.



REGISTERED FAMILY CHILD CARE HOMES

care for up to six children in the provider's home. The home is required to be licensed or registered if care is provided for more than one unrelated child. Child Care Licensing staff may make one unannounced visit each year and may also visit in response to a complaint.

FAMILIES, FRIENDS AND NEIGHBORS

The public schools in Easley follow the School District of Pickens County traditional school calendar schedule - late August through early June - and meet 180 days.

Students in Easley are assigned the school that serves their legal residence, according to the district's established attendance zones. However, parents may request a change of school for their children by submitting an application and request to the principal of the requested school. The principal decides acceptance.

PUBLIC SCHOOL TESTING

Yearly testing for all students

Students in Easley/Pickens County public schools follow the South Carolina State Department of Education testing requirements designed to measure student performance on the goals, objectives and competencies set forth by the state. Following is a list of the state's required tests:

PASS (PALMETTO ASSESSMENT OF STATE **STANDARDS**) Students take PASS in grades 3-8 and are tested on English language arts, mathematics, writing, social studies and science.

EOCEP (END-OF-COURSE EXAMINATION

PROGRAM) The EOCEP tests high school core courses and middle school students for high school credit in the following subject areas: Algebra 1/Math for the Technologies 2; English 1; US History and the Constitution; and Biology 1/Applied Biology 2.

HSAP (HIGH SCHOOL ASSESSMENT PROGRAM) The HSAP is South Carolina's exit exam. Every student must pass the HSAP to graduate from High School.

SC-ALT (SOUTH CAROLINA ALTERNATE ASSESSMENT) The SC-Alt is an alternate assessment for students with significant cognitive disabilities. Students aged 8-13 and 15 as of September 1 of the assessment year are tested.

PRIVATE SCHOOLS

Be an Easley Eagle

There are four private schools in Pickens County, of which one is located in Easley. "Privates" offer small classroom size and low teacher-to-student ratios, offering students individualized attention.

Private schools are tuition-based and often involve a competitive application process, however, many parents want the benefits of

Hometown Pride

Easley Christian School in Easley, serving students 2K-12, offers "traditional education with a biblical foundation." Students at ECS will be offered the highest principles of Christian leadership, self-discipline, individual responsibility, personal integrity, punctuality and good citizenship. The ECS Christian Eagles participate in the SC Association of Christian Schools athletic conference in girls' volleyball, boys' soccer and boys' and girls' basketball.

OTHER PRIVATE SCHOOLS in Pickens County include Clemson Montessori School, age two and a half years through 6th grade (age 12), Providence Christian Academy in Six Mile, 4K-12; and Soaring Eagles Christian Academy in Pickens, 3K-12.

HOME SCHOOLING

There's no place like home!

Although just 10 years ago, homeschooling was considered "cutting edge" education it is now becoming more and more popular in the U.S. and in South Carolina. The top reason parents home school is for their concern about the schooling environment for their children.

Currently, 2% of South Carolina students are being homeschooled, or approximately 16,000 students.

Options

Parents in Easley have three options available to them for home schooling their children: home school under the auspices of a school district; home school with support of the South Carolina Association of Independent Home Schools; or home school with support from a home school association of which the parent is a member.

Some of the local home school associations available to Easley parents include **South** Carolina Association of Independent Home Schools, Easley Home Educators and Anderson Home School Association.

HOME-SCHOOLED CHILDREN IN EASLEY

must receive instruction at least four and a half hours each day for 180 days of the year, although the actual daily schedule can vary. Students will follow a curriculum that includes reading, writing, arithmetic as well as other subjects mandated by the State. Students are also required to take the PASS, HSAP and **EOCEP** tests.

CHILD CARE

ABCs of day care

South Carolina wants to ensure parents have a safe, nurturing environment when they leave their children in day care; however, only licensed providers are required to meet the state's health and safety requirements.



According to the state, "a quality provider has a set program along with written plans for the day; they also have standards for nutrition and physical activity." This means that when you drop your child off for day care, they are well cared for by a professional staff.

Grading Criteria

South Carolina offers a voluntary quality grading system for child care centers and encourages parents to look for the ABC Quality grades of centers before enrolling their children. Grading criteria include health and safety, teacher-to-child ratios, certifications of staff, on-going training for staff and much more.

There are more than 3,000 child care facilities in South Carolina representing the six different types of options available. The options include:

LICENSED CHILD CARE CENTERS are authorized for more than 12 children and are regularly inspected by the Child Care Licensing Staff.

REGISTERED FAITH-BASED CENTERS

care for 13 or more children, are sponsored by a religious organization with the option to be licensed.

LICENSED GROUP CHILD CARE HOMES

care for seven to 12 children in a provider's home and have regular visits from the Child Care Licensing Staff.

LICENSED FAMILY CHILD CARE HOMES

care for up to five children in a provider's home. The home is required to be licensed or registered if care is provided for more than one unrelated child.

REGISTERED FAMILY CHILD CARE HOMES

care for up to six children in the provider's home. The home is required to be licensed or registered if care is provided for more than one unrelated child. Child Care Licensing staff may make one unannounced visit each year and may also visit in response to a complaint.

FAMILIES, FRIENDS AND NEIGHBORS

There are no regulations, standards or requirements for daycare provided by families, friends or neighbors.

Many schools offer before-school and after-school programs for your children for convenience and to help parents keep their children in a safe and learning environment. Check with your children's school for information.

including Spartanburg High School of District 7, the first four-time National Blue Ribbon School, that was named one of the most rigorous high schools in the nation by the Washington Post. The high school offers 24 AP class offerings, more than any other public high school in South Carolina.

"Arts-infused" curriculum

Pine Street Elementary School of District 7, with an "arts-infused" curriculum, is a national model, and the school has also been a recipient of the South Carolina Palmetto Gold Award every year since 2002.

Children also have access to several special focus centers:

McCarthy Teszler School is a school for special needs students. The school serves students aged five to 21 and offers specific programs for students who are disabled or handicapped or emotionally disabled.

DANIEL MORGAN TECHNOLOGY

CENTER for 9-12 graders from Spartanburg HS provides focused training to meet the local business needs. Students can choose career-based programs such as automotive technology, marketing, horticulture and culinary arts.

THE WHITLOCK FLEXIBLE LEARNING

CENTER is home to both the Spartanburg County Alternative School and the Upstate S2TEM Center. SCAS is an alternative school affording students an opportunity to ease

back into the school environment, earn a GED or gain skills to enter the workforce. Upstate S2TEM accelerates student learning in Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics.

Early and Middle Colleges

Developed by the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation as a way of giving high school students greater options and promoting higher education, this tuition-free program allows high-achieving, mature kids to study in small classes. Dual enrollment courses offer students the opportunity to earn college credits while completing their high school diploma.

The Vikings are coming!

The Viking Early College, a partnership between School District 7 and Spartanburg Community College, is a "rigorous yet supportive program" that compresses the time to complete high school and the first two years of college. The Viking program is a maleonly program focused on "first-generation college goers" in families from Spartanburg.

CHARTER SCHOOLS

More school choices

Spartanburg charter schools must be independent public schools that are nonsectarian, nonreligious, non-homebased and nonprofit, as mandated by the State Department of Education. As such, the schools are open to all students in Spartanburg, although they must apply and are subject to acceptance standards. Charter



schools offer smaller classroom size and provide new, innovative and more flexible ways of education.

Two charter schools

There are two charter schools in Spartanburg: High Point Academy for grades K-9 and Spartanburg Preparatory School, grades K-8.

<u>High Point</u> is a community-centered school with a philosophy to "foster the growth and shaping of tomorrow's leaders, challenging them to dream, desire and deliver success."

Spartanburg Prep offers single-gender classes, limits class size to 12 students and offers a "Character Counts Curriculum," a character development framework, as well as foreign language, art, music and PE.

PUBLIC SCHOOL ASSIGNMENT & CALENDAR

Summer vacation starts at the end of May

The 27 public schools in Spartanburg follow the traditional school calendar schedule with a mid-August start date and a late May end, with 180 days of classroom instruction.

Spartanburg students are assigned to a homebased school based on the address where their parents reside. However, District 6 offers limited choice options for K-5 students. If the choice is granted, the student must remain at that school through the highest grade offered.

Rigorous college-prep education

At Meeting street Academy, opened in 2012, following the success of its Charleston namesake, students aged K-5 start early with their "rigorous, college-preparatory education."

Other private schools in Spartanburg include Oakbrook Preparatory School, built on a foundation of Christian faith and offering students K-12 accelerated learning and St. Paul the Apostle Catholic School that helps

students in grades K-8 learn organization and good study skills and habits to help them into their high school years. Spartanburg Christian Academy and Spartanburg Day School round out Spartanburg's private school offerings.

Three options for homeschooling

Parents in Spartanburg have three options available to them for home schooling their children: home school under the auspices of a school district; home school with support of the South Carolina Association of Independent Home Schools; or home school with support from a home school association of which the parent is a member. Some of the local home school associations available to Spartanburg parents include: <u>South Carolina Association</u> of Independent Home Schools, Carolina <u>HomeSchooler</u> and <u>Westgate Christian Home</u> Educators Association.

Daily instruction requirement

Home-schooled children in Spartanburg must receive instruction at least four and a half hours each day for 180 days of the year,



although the actual daily schedule can vary. Students will follow a curriculum that includes reading, writing, arithmetic as well as other subjects mandated by the state. Students are also required to take the PASS, HSAP and **EOCEP** assessment tests.

CHILD CARE

Active and safe day care

South Carolina wants to ensure parents have a safe, nurturing environment when they leave their children in day care, however, only licensed providers are required to meet the state's health and safety requirements.

The state notes that "a quality provider has a set program along with written plans for the day; they also have standards for nutrition and physical activity." This means that when you drop your child off for day care they are well cared for by a professional staff.

Voluntary grading system

South Carolina offers a voluntary quality grading system for child care centers and encourages parents to look for the ABC Quality grades of centers before enrolling their children. Grading criteria include health and safety, teacher-to-child ratios, certifications of staff, on-going training for staff and much more.

Six different types of options

There are more than 3,000 child care facilities in South Carolina representing the available. The options include:

LICENSED CHILD CARE CENTERS are authorized for more than 12 children and are regularly inspected by the Child Care Licensing Staff.

REGISTERED FAITH-BASED CENTERS

care for 13 or more children, are sponsored by a religious organization with the option to be licensed.

LICENSED GROUP CHILD CARE HOMES

care for seven to 12 children in a provider's home and have regular visits from the Child Care Licensing Staff.

LICENSED FAMILY CHILD CARE HOMES

care for up to five children in a provider's home. The home is required to be licensed or registered if care is provided for more than one unrelated child.

REGISTERED FAMILY CHILD CARE HOMES

care for up to six children in the provider's home. The home is required to be licensed or registered if care is provided for more than one unrelated child. Child Care Licensing staff may make one unannounced visit each year and may also visit in response to a complaint.

FAMILIES, FRIENDS AND NEIGHBORS

There are no regulations, standards or requirements for daycare provided by families, friends or neighbors

Special needs

McCarthy Teszler School, serving all of Spartanburg County, is a school for special needs students. The school, about 17 miles away in Spartanburg, serves students aged

five to 21 and offers specific programs for students who are disabled or handicapped or emotionally disabled.

CHARTER SCHOOLS

Charter schools have challenging curriculum

Spartanburg County charter schools must be independent public schools that are nonsectarian, nonreligious, non-home-based and nonprofit, as mandated by the State Department of Education. As such, the schools are open to all students in Woodruff, although they must apply and are subject to acceptance standards. Charter schools offer smaller classroom size and provide new, innovative and more flexible ways of education.

THERE ARE TWO charter schools in Spartanburg, about 17 miles away from Woodruff: High Point Academy for grades K-9 and Spartanburg Preparatory School, grades K-8.

<u>High Point</u> is a community-centered school with a philosophy to "foster the growth and shaping of tomorrow's leaders, challenging them to dream, desire and deliver success."

<u>Spartanburg Prep</u> offers single-gender classes, limits class size to 12 students and offers a "Character Counts Curriculum," a character development framework, as well as foreign language, art, music and PE.



PUBLIC SCHOOL ASSIGNMENT & CALENDAR

Out by Memorial Day

The four public schools in Woodruff follow Spartanburg County's traditional school calendar schedule with a mid-August start date and a late May end, with 180 days of classroom instruction.

Woodruff students are assigned to a homebased school based on the address where their parents reside.

There are no private schools in Woodruff, however, there are five privates nearby in

Spartanburg. Many of the schools offer small classroom size and low teacher-to-student ratios, a faith-based foundation and provide experiential learning including field trips, hands-on labs and mission opportunities.

Private schools are tuition-based and often involve a competitive application process, however, many parents believe the benefits their children gain from the specialized curriculum and the competitive edge gained in college is worth the investment.

At <u>Meeting Street Academy</u>, opened in 2012 following the success of its Charleston namesake, students aged K-5 start early with their "rigorous, college-preparatory education." Other private schools in Spartanburg include Oakbrook Preparatory School, built on a foundation of Christian faith and offering students K-12 accelerated learning and St. Paul the Apostle Catholic School that helps students in grades K-8 learn organization and good study skills and habits to help them into their high school years. Spartanburg Christian Academy and Spartanburg Day School round out Spartanburg's private school offerings.
